


Last year SCC began a new program to connect congregations and pastors and facilitate networking of individuals across the conference. All conference congregations are being encouraged to participate in the 2019 exchange.

Not only does a pulpit exchange give a chance to hear from and meet friends from around the conference, it also allows host congregations to articulate their vision and mission in order to share that with the visiting leaders.

This year's exchange will be very flexible. Possible format suggestions include hosting a question and answer time either during a Sunday School hour or over a shared meal. Pastors are also encouraged to take along a group of congregational leaders when they travel for the exchange. A possible theme scripture and topic will also be suggested for those who desire that guidance. This theme can also be set aside by leaders who wish to focus on another one. The Mennonite Creation Care Network and the Center for Sustainable Climate Solutions have collaborated to bring one of several regional workshops to our area. From April 8-10 at Camp Mennoscah, several speakers will address "Who Cares about Climate Change?: Pastoral Responses to Denial and Despair." The registration fee, which covers meals and lodging, is \$225. However, because of the availability of a grant, Anabaptist pastors can attend at no cost.

Denial and despair help us manage feelings of guilt and helplessness in the face of climate change. How does the Gospel of Jesus Christ give us hope? This workshop is designed to:

- •Connect caring for creation, caring for people and living out God's vision for our world
- •Engage in peer-to-peer exchanges with fellow pastors
- •Listen for God's guidance in the natural world
- •Renew your sense of purpose and hope

DO YOU KNOW?

As we all continue to be aware, immigration remains a concern in our world. Thanks to Marion Bontrager, another book about immigration came to my attention—*The Line Becomes a River*, by Francisco Cantú. Although not from our own press, I found it to be a good companion to last month's book. The two books are similar in organization, moving between the author's personal experiences and historical and geographical background information.

Cantú is bi-racial, the son of a Mexican American mother who raised him when the marriage with his white


American father dissolved. For much of his childhood they lived on several southwestern national parks where his mother was a park ranger.

In his early twenties, in spite of the concerns of his mother, he interrupted his academic career for the rigorous training to join the border patrol. He gives us a great description of the training, his companions in the service, his experiences as he began working, and the southwestern border and its history and environment.

As time went by, he started experiencing emotional problems, and gradually realized

how callous people become who are expected to constantly see, and cause, disappointment, pain, and suffering. That was not who he wanted to be, so he left the border patrol to return to academia.

In the transition, he became close to some illegal immigrants who had left families behind, which gave him the unique perspective that he shares.



Mennonite Church USA Biennial Convention

Information has gone to all member congregations about registering for the convention coming up on July 2-6 in Kansas City, Missouri. As a reminder, all congregations are eligible to name one delegate for each 100 members, or fraction.



In addition, through a program called StepUp, each congregation can appoint a youth as a voting delegate in addition to those chosen according to the formula. A clarification is that a youth thus appointed would not be eligible to register for the youth convention, given the expectation that he or she would participate in the 13.25 hours of delegate assembly time.

All of the organized worship times this year will be joint between adults and youth, with a panel of inspiring and challenging speakers already in place. One of those is Dustin Galyon, head men's basketball coach at Hesston College, who is one of the most sought after motivational speakers for youth groups and others.

Executive Committee Activity

The conference Executive Committee has met three times since the last newsletter was published. Major agenda discussion includes the following items:

- > Received updates from the Strategic Planning Committee which is giving attention to organizational and staffing needs for our conference to continue and expand its missional activity.
- > Approved the continuation of sponsorship of the Hesston College Anabaptist Vision and Discipleship Program's annual weekend conference.
- > Received information about, and promoted participation in, a second grant from the Lilly Endowment via Everence, which is available to pastors to help reduce personal debt, but limited to those who did not benefit from the first such grant.
- > Gave attention to the process of identifying themes and speakers for the annual assembly, to be hosted by Pleasant View Mennonite Church near Hydro, Oklahoma, July 19-20 (see separate article).
- > Developed a plan to promote pastors' participation in a workshop on the topic, "Who Cares about Climate Change: Pastoral Responses to Denial and Despair." It is scheduled on April 8-10 at Camp Mennoscah, with free registration, including meals and lodging, for active pastors.
- > Finalized a Pulpit Fill List, including the names of persons who are available to serve as pulpit supply for congregations needing that service when their pastors are absent.
- > Held conversations with leaders from south Texas churches, organized as UCIM, in an effort to increase and improve communications geared toward strengthening and encouraging their leadership through stronger partnership collaboration. This will include a representative of UCIM as an active participant in future Executive Committee meetings.
- > Reviewed the current budget process and took initial steps to make it more interactive and geared toward expanding our services and resources in support of pastors and congregations.
- > Noted the opportunity for SCC to name three conference delegates to the Mennonite Church USA biennial convention in Kansas City, July 2-6.
- > Received a communication from Myrna Cherry, confirming the formal discontinuation of the Mennonite Women organization, and including her resignation as a member of the Executive Committee.
- > Received reports of the work of the Regional Conference Ministers, including items of interest and concern arising from the RCMs' monthly group meetings.
- > Received an invitation to name a representative to the Prairie View Mental Health Center's board of directors.
- > Heard a report from committee members' participation in the Mennonite Church USA Constituency Leaders Council meeting held in March in Hesston.
- > Set the next meeting for April 15.
